Reflection on the Reading

Today's readings are about love and justice: if we love all people as God loves them, we will also seek justice for them. We follow Christ, who "secures justice for the oppressed" (Responsorial Psalm) and whom God has made "our wisdom and also our justice (Second Reading).

The Gospel teaches us that in the just world of God, the sorrowing are consoled, the lowly inherit the land, the hungry have their fill, and the persecuted rejoice at being insulted and slandered. The love of God is more powerful than all the sin we can muster, and the justice of God overcomes all the world's injustice, its poverty and hunger, its oppression and war, its alienation and domination of others.

Carta del Párroco

Queridos amigos en el Señor,

Tras un proceso de discernimiento comunitario, el pasado otoño comenzamos a hacer algunos pequeños cambios en la forma en que celebramos la liturgia aquí en San Ignacio. Si desean conocer los motivos que nos llevaron a realizar estos cambios, pueden consultar en nuestra página de internet la carta que escribí en su día (entre en la pestaña: “Parish Life” / “Liturgy Commission”). Allí también encontrarán una serie de artículos y vídeos sobre la liturgia. Al comienzo del Adviento, comenzamos a arrodillarnos juntos durante la plegaria eucarística y a ponernos de pie y cantar juntos durante toda la procesión de la comunión. Eliminamos el segundo Aleluia después de la lectura del Evangelio (que resultaba confuso para muchos de nuestros visitantes) y añadimos un período regular de oración silenciosa y reflexiva después de la comunión en cada misa. También hemos recuperado la oportunidad de recibir la comunión bajo las dos especies en la mayoría de las misas, cuando contamos con suficientes ministros eucarísticos.

La razón principal de cada uno de estos cambios fue lograr una mayor unidad a través de una postura común durante toda la misa. La Instrucción General del Misal Romano (IGMR) nos sirvió de guía para las posturas comunes que actualmente practicamos. Quizás el cambio más drástico sea permanecer de pie durante toda la procesión de la comunión, hasta que todos hayan recibido y el copón con las hostias consagradas haya sido colocado en el sagrario. Espero que esta postura sea un recordatorio de que, mediante la liturgia, nos convertimos en lo que recibimos: el único Cuerpo de Cristo. Recordemos que recibir la comunión en la misa no es una devoción privada. Como todos los sacramentos, la Eucaristía es una experiencia comunitaria en la que todos participamos activamente. Juntos nos convertimos en el Cuerpo de Cristo y juntos somos enviados al mundo para continuar la misión de Jesús de paz, justicia y reconciliación. *“Oramos humildemente para que, al participar del Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo, seamos reunidos en uno por el Espíritu Santo”* [Plegaria Eucarística II].

Después de varios meses practicando estas posturas comunes, probablemente sea el momento de evaluar cómo lo estamos haciendo y determinar qué es lo que aún necesitamos ajustar. Estén atentos para obtener más detalles sobre las oportunidades para dialogar sobre su experiencia con los cambios litúrgicos. Espero con interés continuar con nuestro proceso de discernimiento comunitario.

Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends in the Lord,

This past fall, through a process of communal discernment, we began making a few small changes in the way we celebrate the liturgy together here at St. Ignatius. If you would like to review the reasoning behind the changes, the original letter I wrote to the parish can still be found on our website (Parish Life/Liturgy Commission tabs) along with a series of articles and videos about liturgy. At the beginning of Advent, we started kneeling together during the Eucharistic prayer and standing/singing together during the entire communion procession. We dropped the second Alleluia after the reading of the Gospel (which was confusing to our many visitors), and we added a regular period of silent/reflective prayer after the communion procession at every Mass. We have also brought back the opportunity to receive communion under both species at most Masses when we have enough Eucharistic Ministers.

The main reason for making each of these changes was to be more unified through common posture throughout the Mass. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) served as our guide for the common postures we now practice. Perhaps the most dramatic change is standing for the full length of the communion procession until everyone has received and the ciborium with remaining consecrated hosts has been placed in the tabernacle. I hope that this posture of standing and singing together during the communion procession is a reminder that through the action of the liturgy we become what we receive—the one, united Body of Christ. Receiving communion at Mass is not a private devotion. Like all the Sacraments, the Eucharist is a communal experience in which all actively participate. Together we become the Body of Christ, and together we are sent into the world to continue Jesus’ mission of peace, justice and reconciliation. *“Humbly we pray that, partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ, we may be gathered into one by the Holy Spirit.”* [Eucharistic Prayer II]

After several months of practicing these common postures, it’s probably time to evaluate how we’re doing and determine what we still need to fine-tune. Stay tuned for more details about opportunities to discuss your experience with the liturgical changes. I look forward to continuing our process of communal discernment.

At our next Racial Justice Committee meeting, we will discuss how the parish might respond to a letter received from Saint Katharine Drexel Parish in Boston. Their congregation is motivated by a growing concern about our country's immigration policies. As individuals and as a group, St Ignatius community has been actively addressing the needs of our brothers and sisters who turn to us in this troubled time. Our numbers are few and their humanitarian and civil needs require greater support. St. Katharine Drexel's letter asked our parish (and others) to respond to the following three questions:

- How, if at all, are your parishioners being affected by the current situation?
- What, if anything, are you as a parish doing in response?
- Is there anything we might do together as parishes of the archdiocese of Boston do to keep our people safe and to act for the common good at this moment?

We recognize that St Ignatius parishioners have different views concerning these questions. We hope that prayerfully listening to a variety of perspectives will enable our parish to respond thoughtfully. **The meeting will take place via Zoom from 7:00 to 8:15 pm.**

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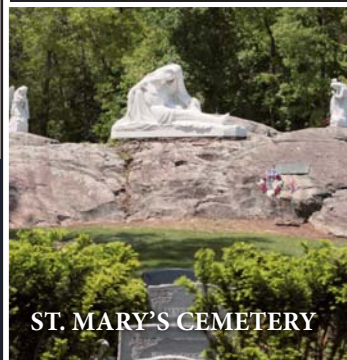
