

Reflection on the Reading

Today as a Church, we conclude our liturgical year and celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. The Gospel we proclaim shows the great mystery of our faith: In the moment of his crucifixion, Jesus is shown to be King and Savior of all.

Luke's Gospel has been loaded with surprises: the poor are rich, sinners find salvation, the Kingdom of God is found in our midst. Here we see the greatest surprise of all. We are confronted with the crucified Jesus, whom faith tells us is King and Savior of all. The irony is that the inscription placed on the cross, perhaps in mockery, contains the profoundest of truth. Jesus is King, but not the kind of king we might have imagined or expected. His kingship was hidden from many of his contemporaries, but those who had the eyes of faith were able to see. As modern disciples of Jesus, we, too, are invited to see that Jesus, the crucified One, is indeed King and Savior of all.

Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends in the Lord,

At this time of year, I often think of St. Ignatius Loyola's teaching about the importance of gratitude in the spiritual life:

"It seems to me in the light of the Divine Goodness, although others may think differently, that ingratitude is the most abominable of sins and that it should be detested in the sight of our Creator and Lord by all of His creatures who are capable of enjoying His divine and everlasting glory. For it is a forgetting of the gracious benefits and blessings received. As such it is the cause, beginning, and origin of all sins and misfortunes. On the contrary, the grateful acknowledgment of blessings and gifts received is loved and esteemed not only on earth but in heaven." [*The Letters of St. Ignatius of Loyola*, William J. Young, S.J., Chicago, 1959]

Gratitude is the most basic and essential prayer. The spiritual life is grounded in the awareness that all of life is a gift from God. When we live each day in a spirit of gratitude the whole world looks different. Gratitude calls us to conversion and to a life lived for and with others. Starting and ending each day with a prayer of gratitude helps us to recognize the gifts God has given us to share with the world. Gratitude helps us to discern God's call and respond with hearts on fire. Gratitude always leads to generosity. It fills us with the holy desire to give and not to count the cost, to fight and not to heed the wounds, to toil and not to seek for rest, to labor and not to ask for reward.

This Thanksgiving I am deeply grateful for the privilege of serving as your pastor. Your smiles, tears, prayers, dreams, successes, and struggles fill my heart and mind each night as I reflect on my day with God. Thank you for sharing with me your faith, your hope, and your love.

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
