At all Masses this weekend, we will take up a Second Collection for **Hands Together: Haiti** using the envelopes in the pews or by scanning the QR code.




Reflection on the Reading

Following upon the teaching of the Beatitudes, Jesus uses the now familiar metaphors of salt and light to describe the life of discipleship. Jesus' call to be salt for the earth and light for the world powerfully states our mission as Church and as Christians. Our commitment to social justice flows from the exhortation that Jesus gives us in today's Gospel. Some of the activities that this commitment leads us to are given more concrete expression as the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy. When we feed the hungry, clothe the naked, console those who mourn, and so on, we show ourselves to be the salt of the earth and the light of the world. When we do these things with the community of faith, the Church, we are indeed acting as "a city set on a mountain" that cannot be hidden!

Black History Month

2026 is the 100-year anniversary of organized recognition of Black history and culture in the United States. What began as a week in 1926 has since developed into a month-long celebration.



As part of Black History Month, the Racial Justice Committee will host a **showing of the new film Hidden in Plain Sight: The History of Black Catholics in Boston on Sunday, February 22, at 6:00 pm.** Produced by the Archdiocese, the film sheds light on the history of Black Catholics through insightful interviews with members of Boston's Black Catholic community. After the half-hour screening, a small panel will reflect on the themes of the documentary and share their insights and lived experiences. Carta del Párroco

Queridos amigos en el Señor:

Pasé tres minutos viendo el video sobre Haití en la página de Hands Together (www.handstogether.org). Me ha emocionado mucho porque me ha recordado el tiempo que pasé trabajando en la parroquia de Santa Ana en Kingston, Jamaica, cuando era un joven jesuita. Ese tiempo privilegiado me ayudó a comprender que formo parte de una familia humana única y mundial. Todos somos hijos de Dios, hermanos y hermanas en Cristo, y debemos amarnos y apoyarnos unos a otros. Los jamaiquinos que llegué a conocer y amar me inspiraron a aprender más sobre las causas de la pobreza, la injusticia y la opresión, y sobre cómo la Doctrina Social de la Iglesia puede ayudarnos a responder a los lamentos de los más vulnerables en el mundo.

Este fin de semana, como parte del Programa Cooperativo Misionero anual, el Sr. Douglas Campbell, en representación de Hands Together (Haití) y la Sociedad para la Propagación de la Fe, hablará en todas las misas. La Sociedad para la Propagación de la Fe es una de las cuatro Obras Misionales Pontificias representadas aquí en la Arquidiócesis de Boston. El Sr. Campbell compartirá historias de las misiones y nos ayudará a establecer una conexión espiritual con otras personas cuyas vidas pueden ser muy diferentes a las nuestras. La Sociedad para la Propagación de la Fe es la agencia misionera oficial de la Iglesia Católica dedicada a ayudar y apoyar a los laicos, sacerdotes y religiosos en su labor misionera y evangelizadora. En las bancas hay sobres para la segunda colecta de este fin de semana. También pueden llevarse el sobre a casa para enviar su donativo por correo (incluya el nombre de nuestra parroquia para que así se nos contabilice con su donativo).

La visita del Sr. Campbell a nuestra parroquia es una oportunidad para reflexionar sobre nuestra relación con nuestra extensa familia humana, especialmente con aquellos hermanos y hermanas que más sufren. Sé que algunas veces los feligreses se quejan de que escuchar las cuestiones nacionales e internacionales de actualidad en la misa dominical... sobre todo después de haber sido bombardeados con comentarios políticos agotadores durante toda la semana. Algunos prefieren que las homilías y las oraciones eviten la "política" y se centren en la espiritualidad personal o en consejos sobre cómo amar a Dios y a los miembros de nuestra familia. Sin duda, el púlpito no es un lugar para la política partidista -y puedo comprender a quienes sufren de fatiga política, especialmente en estos tiempos turbulentos en los que la política de nuestro país es tan caótica, corrupta y cruel-, pero como somos miembros de una única familia humana, nuestra espiritualidad personal siempre tendrá una dimensión comunitaria, de modo que nuestro amor a Dios y a la familia siempre implicará una reflexión de fe sobre los temas políticos actuales a la luz del Evangelio y de la Doctrina Social de la Iglesia.

Letter from the Pastor

Dear Friends in the Lord,

I just spent three minutes watching the video about Haiti on the Hands Together website (<https://www.handstogether.org>). I was really moved by the video because it reminded me of the time I spent working at St. Anne's Parish in Kingston, Jamaica as a young Jesuit novice. That privileged time with the wonderful people of Jamaica helped me to understand that I am part of a worldwide human family. We are all children of God, brothers and sisters in Christ, and we need to love and support each other. The Jamaicans I came to know and love inspired me to learn more about the causes of poverty, injustice, and oppression, and how our rich tradition of Catholic Social Teaching can help us respond to the cries of our most vulnerable family members around the world.

This weekend, as part of the annual Missionary Co-Operative Program, Mr. Douglas Campbell, representing Hands Together (Haiti) and The Society of the Propagation of the Faith, will speak at all Masses. The Society for Propagation of the Faith is one of the four Pontifical Mission Societies represented here in the Archdiocese of Boston. Mr. Campbell will share stories of the missions and help us build a spiritual connection to others whose daily lives may be very different from ours. The Society of the Propagation of the Faith is the official mission agency of the Catholic Church dedicated to assisting and supporting laypeople, priests, and religious in their evangelizing missionary work. Envelopes are in the pews for this weekend's second collection. You can also take the envelope home to mail your gift. Please be sure to identify our parish so that we are credited for your gift.

Mr. Campbell's visit to our parish is an opportunity for us to reflect on our relation to our extended human family, especially those brothers and sisters who are suffering the most. Sometimes parishioners complain that hearing about current national and international issues at Sunday Mass is too wearying, especially after being bombarded with exhausting political commentary all week. Some prefer that homilies and prayers avoid "politics" by staying focused on personal spirituality or advice on how to love God and our family members. The pulpit is certainly no place for partisan politics, and I can sympathize with those suffering from political fatigue, especially at this tumultuous time when our country's politics are so chaotic, corrupt and cruel. But because we are members of a worldwide human family, our personal spirituality will always have a communal dimension, and our love for God and family will always involve prayerful reflection on the political issues of our day in light of the Gospel and the Church's social teaching.



For the fourth year now, St. Ignatius Parish will participate in Greener Lent. Greener Lent asks us to prayerfully reduce our meat consumption for Lent in order to reduce the negative impact of meat production on the climate. Last year, St. Ignatius parishioners kept over 5,000 pounds of CO₂ from entering the atmosphere! 
Through this experience, retreatants deepen their experience of God's presence in their lives and make a commitment of:

What are the *Spiritual Exercises*?

In the 1520s, St. Ignatius of Loyola wrote about the emotions that took hold of him—feelings of gratitude and anguish, consolation and sadness—while encountering the Scriptures. Those meditations eventually became the *Spiritual Exercises*, which were first published in 1548.

The *Spiritual Exercises* is like a handbook of meditations, prayers, and other contemplative practices, with the goal of helping people develop their attentiveness, their openness, and their responsiveness to God. While Jesuits typically make the Exercises over the course of a 30-day silent retreat, another popular version is the 19th Annotation, which someone can do while continuing their daily responsibilities. St. Ignatius Parish offers the 19th Annotation in the fall and spring every year.

Plant a Centennial Tree!


Do you have a favorite tree that you'd like to see planted at St. Ignatius?

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
