From the Desk of the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Why do we sing the *Gospel Alleluia* not only before the Gospel, but also after the Gospel at all the weekend Masses at St. Ignatius? Do we like to be different? After all, many in the congregation—and particularly visitors—are used to sitting down right after we say, "Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ." With this concluding alleluia, some feel awkward standing right back up again!

Perhaps you have gotten used to it by now, but maybe you have had similar questions and wonderings about our singing that second alleluia at the end of the Gospel. Isn't it a bit much?

As some may recall, our parish began this practice in response to Pope Francis's Apostolic Letter, *Aperuit illis*, the first two words of Lk 24:25 from the Road to Emmaus appearance – "He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures."

Issued on September 30, 2019, this letter decreed that the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time "be devoted to the celebration, study and dissemination of the word of God." We therefore celebrate this weekend our third annual Word of God Sunday.

Pope Francis asks that each community find its own way to mark, "with a certain solemnity," this special day. He asks "that in the Eucharistic celebration the sacred text be enthroned, in order to focus the attention of the assembly on the normative value of God's word." In keeping with this idea, in all our liturgies this weekend, we will enthrone our Book of the Gospels, incense it, and, of course, continue our practice of singing the second alleluia response.

Unsurprisingly, in that same letter Pope Francis encourages that the Sunday of the Word of God "should not be seen as a yearly event but rather a year-long event, for we urgently need to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and of the risen Lord, who continues to speak his word and to break bread in the community of believers."

As a sign of our reverence for sacred Scripture, I hope we will continue to embrace the practice of singing this second alleluia. More importantly, I hope it serves as a reminder to help us, in the words of Pope Francis's at the conclusion of *Aperuit illis*, "to grow in religious and intimate familiarity with the sacred Scriptures."

In it you will hear mention of a practice I first heard about on my first silent directed retreat of discernment that I made in 1976 before entering the Society of Jesus: *lectio divina* or divine reading. My Jesuit retreat director explained that it is a way of ruminating on the words of the Bible, "sort of like a cow chewing cud." Read slowly and reflectively, and pause when struck by a word or phrase.

The point of this practice is illuminated by a little story I once heard of a young student of Torah asking a senior rabbi



Estimados Feligreses:

¿Por qué cantamos el *Alleluia evangélico* no sólo antes del Evangelio, sino también después del mismo en todas las misas del fin de semana en San Ignacio? ¿Nos gusta ser diferentes? Después de todo, muchos en la congregación, y particularmente los visitantes, están acostumbrados a sentarse justo después de que decimos: "Gloria a ti, Señor Jesús". Con este aleluya final, algunos se sienten incómodos y se ponen de pie de nuevo!

Tal vez ya se hayan acostumbrado, pero tal vez hayan tenido preguntas similares sobre nuestro canto de ese segundo aleluya al final del Evangelio. ¿No es demasiado?

Como algunos recordarán, nuestra parroquia comenzó esta práctica en respuesta a la Carta Apostólica del Papa Francisco, *Aperuit illis*, las dos primeras palabras de Lc 24:25 sobre la aparición del Camino a Emaús: "Él abrió sus mentes para entender las Escrituras".

Emitida el 30 de septiembre de 2019, esta carta decretó que el Tercer Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario "se dedique a la celebración, estudio y difusión de la palabra de Dios". Por lo tanto, celebramos este fin de semana nuestro tercer domingo anual de la Palabra de Dios.

El Papa Francisco pide que cada comunidad encuentre su propio camino para marcar, "con cierta solemnidad", este día especial. Pide "que en la celebración eucarística se entronice el texto sagrado, para centrar la atención de la asamblea en el valor normativo de la palabra de Dios". De acuerdo con esta idea, en todas nuestras liturgias de este fin de semana, entronizaremos nuestro Libro de los Evangelios, se le echará incienso y, por supuesto, continuaremos nuestra práctica de cantar la segunda respuesta aleluya.

Como era de esperar, en esa misma carta, el Papa Francisco alienta a que el domingo de la Palabra de Dios "no debe ser visto como un evento anual, sino más bien como un evento de un año, porque necesitamos urgentemente crecer en nuestro conocimiento y amor por las Escrituras y por el Señor resucitado, que continúa hablando su palabra y partiendo el pan en la comunidad de creyentes".

Como signo de nuestra reverencia por las Sagradas Escrituras, espero que sigamos abrazando la práctica del canto de este segundo aleluya. Más importante aún, espero que sirva como un recordatorio para ayudarnos, en palabras del Papa Francisco al final de *Aperuit illis*, "a crecer en familiaridad religiosa e íntima con las Sagradas Escrituras".

En él escucharán mencionar una práctica que escuché por primera vez en mi primer retiro dirigido silencioso de discernimiento que hice en 1976 antes de ingresar a la Compañía de Jesús: la *lectio divina* o lectura divina. Mi director

about how he might deepen his spiritual practice and grow in wisdom. The rabbi asked, "well, what have you done so far? "The student responded, "I have gone through all the Torah." At which point the rabbi questioned, "Good, but has the Torah gone through you?"

May our practice of *lectio divina* this year help sacred Scripture penetrate to the very marrow of our bones, the deepest recesses of our heart, so that we may grasp more fully the beauty of God's word and in turn come more fully, as the theme of the Ignatian year we are celebrating bids us, "to see all things new in Christ."

El punto de esta práctica está iluminado por una pequeña historia que una vez escuché sobre un joven estudiante de la Torá preguntándole a un rabino mayor sobre cómo podría profundizar su práctica espiritual y crecer en sabiduría. El rabino preguntó: "Bueno, ¿qué has hecho hasta ahora?" El estudiante respondió: "He pasado por toda la Torá". En ese momento, el rabino preguntó: "Bien, pero ¿ha pasado la Torá por ti?"

Que nuestra práctica de la *lectio divina* en este año ayude a la Sagrada Escritura a penetrar hasta la médula misma de nuestros huesos, los recovecos más profundos de nuestro corazón, para que podamos captar más plenamente la belleza de la palabra de Dios y, a su vez, venga más plenamente, como nos propone el tema del año ignaciano que celebramos, a "ver todas las cosas nuevas en Cristo".



Parishioners **Suzanne Piening and Denny Martin** will co-facilitate nine two-hour sessions through the lens of our Catholic tradition.





40 Days of Prayer by Cheri Mills.







Webinar: "Celebrating Synodality: Synod as a Spiritual Practice"

Sunday, January 23rd | 4:00 - 5:15 p.m.

Rather than just “holding” synods and councils, the church “celebrates” them. A synod is not a meeting at which there happens to be some prayer, but instead is itself a liturgy, a collective act of prayer and discernment.

Dr. Brian Flanagan, a theologian at Marymount University, Virginia, will outline the liturgical and spiritual foundations of synodality, and explore how all Catholics, especially LGBTQ Catholics and their supporters, can prepare and respond to Pope Francis’s call for full and active participation in the Synod on Synodality.

Dr. Flanagan is currently writing a book on synodality.

New Ways Ministry will host Spiritual Conversations for LGBTQ people and their supporters to contribute to the Synod on Synodality. If you would like to participate, These Spiritual Conversations are rooted in the Ignatian tradition for discerning the will of the Holy Spirit in a community of faith. In small, intimate, prayer-grounded conversations of six-eight people, a space of encounter with the others and with the Spirit is created. The fruits of these conversations are captured by a note-taker and sent to the Vatican's Synod Office to be included in the larger Synod process.

The program will be facilitated by **Dr. Robert Choiniere** of Fordham University's theology department, an expert on church consultation processes. He will be assisted by a team of trained discussion leaders.




